The Portfolio Workshop day **originally** scheduled for Thursday, October 27 is **now rescheduled for Tuesday, November 1, 2005, 7 – 9 pm**. Study the life of Martin Luther King, Jr. and visit Tennessee, Mississippi, Alabama and Georgia during J-term, **Hop On The Bus**. This course covers the life and legacy of Martin Luther King, Jr. as well as trips to historic Civil Rights sites in the south. Meet history-makers and foot soldiers who took part in one of the most influential periods of time in American history. We will spend the first week on campus studying the life of MLK. The second week will be spent visiting The Lorraine Motel (where MLK was assassinated), Ole Miss (where a 48-hour civil war broke out over the entrance of an African-American student), Rosa Parks museum, Southern Poverty Law Center (organization dedicated to teaching and supporting tolerance), the Voting Rights Museum, 16th Street Baptist Church (where 4 little girls were killed in a church bombing), the Birmingham Civil Rights Institute and the King Center as well as several other historic sites. Cost for travel, food and lodging is \$500. Deposits of \$100 are due by November 1st. The balance will be due December 9th. TRIP TO THE HOLY LAND – ISRAEL - Are you interested in spending January's J-Term in Israel? Visit the Florida Everglades in January as part of the new J-Term course, American Environmental History! The course covers topics in North American natural history and ecology from the pre-Colombian period to the present, including changing patterns of land use, economic development and natural resource appropriation, changing forest and wetlands biomes, and environmental ethics. Special attention will be given to concepts in Christian environmental stewardship. The eight-day field experience in Everglades and Biscayne National Parks features close study of wetlands and coastal ecologies, so students should be prepared for hiking, canoeing, snorkeling, sailing, camping, and other outdoor activities. Total cost for travel, food, lodging, and other expenses is \$350. Non-refundable deposits of \$100 must be paid to the Business Office by November 1st, and final balance is due December 9th. "The Adventure of Marriage" a J-term course: Are you engaged to be married, or moving close to that decision? This class is for couples (both people required). Couples who are thinking about getting married will benefit from looking at the various areas of married life that need to be explored in preparation for a successful marriage. Major areas to be covered include: personality issues, expectations, extended family relationships, communication and conflict resolution, finances, intimacy and sexuality, leisure activities, children and parenting, and spiritual values. Here's what one couple who took the course have to say: "People spend lots of money and time preparing for their wedding date, but seldom do they invest in getting ready for the rest of their lives together. This class helped our marriage in many ways. We had such a wonderful time, learning new things about each other, building our relationship, and fellowshiping with other couples. It was a very safe environment to explore any and all questions about marriage with experienced couples. We strongly advise anyone who is thinking about marriage to enroll in this class." **An important part of this course** will be a three-day retreat at a ski lodge in Michigan. Space is limited (past classes have filled up fast), so if you are interested, we need to hear from you so you can get on our list!
