**You are invited to the All-Campus Thanksgiving Dinner.** The date is Wed. Nov. 16<sup>th</sup> from 5:30–6:30 pm in both the Dining Commons and all three banquet rooms.

**HEALTH SERVICES** - All **first year students** to Huntington University should have turned in a yellow health record form, which would include their immunization records as well as a physical by a physician. If this record is not complete and on file with the Health Services Dept., students will be **placed on hold status** and be unable to register for classes. Also, if students are still needing to receive a Menomune shot for meningitis, tetanus shot, or TB test, stop by Health Services between the hours of 10:00am and 2:30pm to have those completed. If these shots or tests are **not complete** students can also be placed on hold status. Students that are still needing to begin the Hepatitis A or Hepatitis B shot series, need to begin that starting the week of October 31. Both the Hepatitis A and Hepatitis B shots are required for those students going to assist with hurricane relief or traveling outside of the United States. Please keep in mind that the Hepatitis A is a 2 shot series and the Hepatitis B is a 3 shot series. If you have any questions, contact Health Services at **ext. 4072**.

**REMINDER:** Students will be placed on a hold status and will be unable to register for classes or receive a transcript if they have **any** outstanding financial obligations. These obligations can include, but are not limited to, student account balances (loans not processed/dispensed or AMS payment plan shortages), parking fines, dorm fines, disciplinary fines, chapel fines, medical fines (failure to pay for vaccinations), past-due rent, library fines or overdue library materials. **All library fines must be paid at the library**, however all other fines can be paid in the business office during cashier hours. **The cashier hours in the business office are 9:00 AM until 4:00 PM Monday through Friday.** Please make payments in the business office during cashier hours.
