January 2006 travel opportunity: PARIS. I am offering a J-term that involves a trip to Paris. The cost of the trip (**7 days in Paris**) **would be approximately \$1500 which would include airfare, travel in France, morning and evening meals, and most entrance fees.** (Adjustments to the price may need to be made to account for travel to the airport and fluctuating ticket prices, but it should remain within \$200 of this approximation); you would be responsible for your own spending money. The J-term will involve spending the first week or so on campus studying the history of Paris; then we will spend the second week (January 11-January 19 2006) in Paris. If you are interested, I need to know by the end of September. Payment is due by October 1st.
