Joe has written but says little about his wife, intimates that she needs pointed advice, says she did not care to send any word in his letters. They have moved in with the Wilberforces, and evidently, it is not pleasant. She went to Rev. Funk, before she came to me, but he gave her no satisfaction, and <sup>he</sup> is probably influenced by the Wilberforces' statements to him when he was there, recently. Joe has been jealous of her <sup>wife</sup>. I have more confidence in her than in any of them. But alas, poor woman! Mrs. Heavlow is now in Lexington, Ky. I do not think Joe will long continue with the old folks.

Wilbur has been gone some two weeks, and Orville will go to-day. So Katharine and I will probably be alone most of this year.

I hope that you will have a pleasant time at Hartsville. Perhaps you will look at President Shuck's monument, and report to me about it, and find how the land ~~xxx~~ lies in that suburb.

Rev. L. E. Flinneman talks of going to Oklahoma for a year and says he might take a station or some light work there.
