Iowa Conference.

The Iowa annual conference of the United Brethren in Christ, met in its sixty-fifth session in the Arlington church, Arlington circuit, October 28, 1909, at 2:00 p. m., Bishop C. L. Wood presiding. After reading 1 Thessalonians 5th chapter, Rev. J. S. Moore offered prayer, and the bishop gave us some very timely remarks exhorting us to return to the old time class and prayer meetings where so many found peace and received that growth in the spirit that kept them faithful to their duties.

The roll was then called by the former secretary, J. S. Moore. Then the transfer of F. E. Morrison from Wisconsin conference, was read by the bishop and on motion he was received into the Iowa conference. J. S. Moore was then elected secretary and the conference was duly organized. One lay delegate was present who was in full sympathy with the workings of the church and was of great help on the different committees. The presiding elder, I. N. Warfield, not being present, nor sending any report hindered some.
