He has resided in Akron, Ohio about six years where he passed away. He leaves to mourn a kind and devoted wife, three sons and two daughters, two brothers and three sisters and seven grandchildren. He was a kind and loving husband and father. He loved the house of God. His seat was never vacant when he was able to get there.
