

Mrs. Henry Rathburn

Catherine Kinsley Was born in Ontario, Lagrange County, Indiana, Aug. 21, 1862, the youngest of five children, all of whom preceded her in death, departed this life peacefully in the Rathburn farm home, Clear Lake Township, Ind., Friday, March 13, 1942.

She was the daughter of early pioneers who came to Indiana. The father, James, Kinsley, was a private in the 100th Indiana Infantry in the Civil War, enlisting at Lagrange, took sick and died at Berlin Heights, Miss., July 18, 1863. Her mother was Catherine Brooks. She attended school in the Harris School, Clear Lake Twp.; also the York School.

Catherine Kinsley was united in marriage to Henry Rathburn July 14, 1878, at South Camden, Hillsdale County, Michigan. To this union were born Charles, Ernest, and one daughter Maggie, all of whom preceded her in death except Ernest the son, who with his wife operate the farm. Early in their married life Mrs. Rathburn and Mr. Rathburn joined the United Brethren Church where she has been a faithful member.

Mr. and Mrs. Rathburn have been engaged in farming their entire lives, they moving to the present Rathburn farm in the early 80's, where Mr. Rathburn was born and which his father had purchased in the early 50's. Last year they celebrated their 63rd wedding anniversary.

Left to mourn the passing of this good mother are the husband, Henry Rathburn, one son, Ernest; three grandsons—Albert Rice of Auburn; George Rice of Minneapolis, and Max Rathburn, son of Ernest, who has lived continuously with his parents and grandparents; great-grandchildren—MaryEllen McNutt, Max, Don, and Barbara Lou, Catherine, Audry, George Jr., and Barbara, one great-grand-grandson, Donald McNutt.
