Magdaline Wild, (nee.) Wohrle was born at Badon, Germany, Sept. 21, 1850 and departed this life at her home in Hastings, Nebraska April 18, 1922, age seventy-one years, nine months and twenty-six days. She came to the U. S. when but a child and grew to womanhood near Forest City, Mason Co., Ill. She was united in Marriage to Rev. George L. Wild, March 20, 1871, near Manito, Ill. To them were born thirteen children, six of whom have preceded her to the life beyond. In the year 1880 she with her husband and family moved to Dorchester, Nebraska and has ever since resided in the State. At the age of eighteen years Sister Wild gave her heart to the Lord and later joined the United Brethren church, to which she was true and faithful to the last. She loved good books and pure literature, but to her the book of all books was the Bible. She loved to attend church and was a power for good, but in late years she has been deprived of public worship on account of poor health, but always prayed earnestly at home for the church she loved so well. She has made this old world better by her devoted Christian life and by dedicating three sons and one daughter to the Gospel Ministry, two sons Rev's. F. R. and C. J. Wild are pastors in South Dakota conference, and one son Rev. A. O. Wild and a daughter Rev. Elizabeth have gone to their reward; Sister Wild was a liberal giver to the cause of Missions. Funeral services were held from the home April 20, conducted by the writer, assisted by Rev. J. C. Walker, of the Nazarene church, after which she was laid to rest in the Hastings cemetery. Besides her husband and seven children she leaves several grandchildren, three brothers, three sisters, and many other relatives and friends to mourn their loss. The cause of her death was Pneumonia, the end came peacefully and suddenly. May God comfort the sorrowing ones and help them to live so they can meet Wife, Mother and Sister in the Sweet Bye and Bye.
