REBECCA ROSS, wife of Rev. D. J. B. Ross, was born in Trumbull County, Ohio, February 29, 1827, and removed with her parents (Joseph Lafferty and wife) to Illinois, April 2, 1853. She was united in marriage to Rev. D. J. B. Ross, August 2, 1855, sharing with him the trials and privations of an itinerant's life. Leaving her share of the labor as well as a martyr or complaint, ever ready to give her counsel to help or encourage the weak, to advise the erring, to acknowledge the Master whenever or wherever necessary, and to assist and strengthen her husband in his arduous duties in which he was engaged; and after a long and tiresome journey with him, in 1874, they together fought nobly for the truth, she in the meantime suffering great affliction, on the 24th of July the messenger came, and she fell asleep in Jesus, at her home in Havana, Kan., aged 66 years, 5 months, and 9 days, leaving an aged companion, one sister, and many friends to mourn their loss; but the loss falls heaviest on him who has loved and led her through all these years. Although her end came in a strange way, she had hosts of friends to tender to her in the trying ordeal, and kind hands to prepare her for the city of the dead. The people came in haste to show their love and respect for her who had gone, and their sympathy with the sorrowing ones. Hers was a fitting end for one that had lived so faithfully; for she passed peacefully and triumphantly into the loving arms of her Redeemer.

SOPHIA PENIX was born near Wilmet, Stark County, Ohio, and died near Windfield, Tuscarawas County, Ohio, June 9, 1893, aged 90 years, 2 months, and 2 days. She was united in marriage to William Penix, May 19, 1850. To this union ten children have proceeded to the spirit world, and seven children are left to mourn the loss of a kind and affectionate mother. Mother Penix was converted in her fourteenth year and joined the United Brethren Church, in which she has lived a consistent Christian life for over forty-six years.
