**THE NORTH-WESTERN'S MOVING PALACE.**

New Pullman Sleepers for the Chicago-San Francisco Service.

One of the handsomest Pullman sleepers ever seen in this city passed through yesterday afternoon attached to "The Overland Limited." The "Laramie," as the new car has been named, was built in the shop of the Pullman Co., Pullman, Ill., and this is its first bow to the public. The car is seventy feet long, and of the usual depth. It is equipped with the new extension vestibule, and all other improvements known to the company at the present time.

Inside, the car is a miniature palace. Green, vermilion, and blue are the prevailing colors, and the tapestries and draperies of the state-rooms are colored to match, formed of heavy silk. The smoking room is of Turkish design in its upholstery. The deck lights, or ventilators, are of elliptical form, and are filled with art glass, being of unusual handsome design.

There are two state rooms, one being the usual equipment for a Pullman; but owing to the distance between Chicago and San Francisco, it was thought wise to add an extra room to the new car. The finish is of mahogany, heavily inlaid with colored wood. The ceiling is of blue, with designs of stars.

The "Laramie" is the first of a number of Pullman cars ordered by the North-Western-Union Pacific for the Chicago-San Francisco run.—*Omaha (Neb.) Bee.*
