

Huntington University Steps for a Positive **STUDENT** COVID-19 Test

Huntington, Indiana Campus

Upon receiving notification of a positive test for a student, Huntington University will:

- Recommend the student seek medical care as needed, either through ForesterCare or a personal physician. The student is ultimately responsible for making this contact for medical care. If the student needs to be transported for medical care, the student may elect to drive if he/she is able. If the student is unable to drive and the situation is of a non-emergent nature, a member of the Student Life staff will contact Huntington Area Transport (HAT) for the student to be transported.
- Ensure the student has resources necessary during isolation.
 - The student will move items, with the assistance of Student Life staff, into Hardy Hall for isolation.
 - The resident director will coordinate with Sodexo to ensure meals will be provided.
 - The Office of the Academic Dean will communicate with faculty to arrange virtual course access for the student in isolation. The Information Technology Office will provide support to facilitate the virtual learning experience.
 - Cleaning supplies and additional necessary items will be provided and in place. After the student completes the isolation timeframe, the room will be thoroughly cleaned by the housekeeping staff.
- Communicate with need-to-know HU personnel to ensure proper support is provided. The personnel list receiving the communication will include, but not necessarily be limited to: the resident director of the building in which the student resides, the designee within the Office of Student Life assisting with contact tracing, Chief Information Officer, Chief Operating Officer, Vice President for Academic Affairs, Vice President for Student Life, and President. Additional communication will be sent for students involved in various groups, such as athletics, leadership, theater, etc.
- Notify the Huntington County Department of Health to confirm their knowledge of a positive test. This notification will be done by the Chief Operating Officer.
 - The Huntington County Department of Health will work with consultants to complete official contact tracing processes (see information below).
- Perform internal contact tracing to determine additional students, faculty, or staff that may need to be notified. The Chief Operating Officer will work with the designee from the Office of Student Life to complete this process. All communications regarding contact tracing and COVID-19 will be developed or reviewed by University Relations and approved by the President.
- Determine the timeframe for the student to leave isolation and return to normal activity. This will follow CDC recommended timelines which is defined as follows:

after at least 10 days since symptoms first appeared and at least 24 hours with no fever without fever-reducing medication and symptoms have improved.

HU Arizona

Upon receiving notification of a positive test for a student, the HU Arizona will:

- Inform the Director of Arizona Operations. The Director will communicate with the need-to-know personnel at the Huntington, Indiana campus. The personnel list receiving the communication will include, but not necessarily be limited to, the designee within the Office of Student Life assisting with contact tracing, Chief Information Officer, Chief Operating Officer, Vice President for Academic Affairs, Vice President for Student Life, and President.
- Recommend the student seek medical care as needed, either through ForesterCare or a personal physician. The student is ultimately responsible for making this contact for medical care.
- Ensure the student understands the need to isolate and not report to the facility for class or any other purpose until the isolation period has ended.
- Perform internal contract tracing to determine additional students, faculty, or staff that may need to be notified. The Maricopa County Department of Public Health will complete official contact tracing processes (see information below).

HU Fort Wayne

Upon receiving notification of a positive test for a student, the HU Fort Wayne will:

- Inform the OTD Director. The Director will communicate with the need-to-know personnel at the Huntington, Indiana campus. 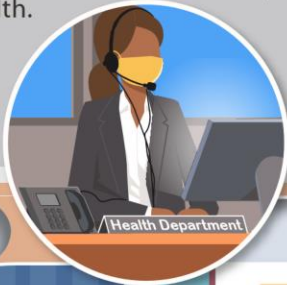
The Allen County Department of Health will complete official contact tracing processes (see information below).

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT TO HAPPEN DURING CONTACT TRACING IF YOU HAVE BEEN DIAGNOSED WITH COVID-19.

If you have been diagnosed with COVID-19, a public health worker will call you to check on your health.



They will ask you who you've been in contact with and where you spent time while you were sick and may have spread COVID-19 to others.

Any information you share with public health workers is **CONFIDENTIAL**.

This means that your personal and medical information will be kept private.

You will also be asked to **stay at home and self-isolate**, if you are not doing so already.

Self-isolation means **staying at home in a specific room away from other people and pets, and using a separate bathroom, if possible**.

Self-isolation helps slow the spread of COVID-19 and can keep your family, friends, and community safe.

If you need support or assistance while self-isolating, the health department or a local community organization **may be able to provide assistance**.

Continue to monitor your health. **If your symptoms worsen or become severe, you should seek medical care.** Severe symptoms include trouble breathing, persistent pain or pressure in the chest, confusion, inability to wake or stay awake, or bluish lips or face.

CONTACT TRACING: WHAT TO EXPECT IF YOU MAY HAVE BEEN EXPOSED TO SOMEONE WITH COVID-19

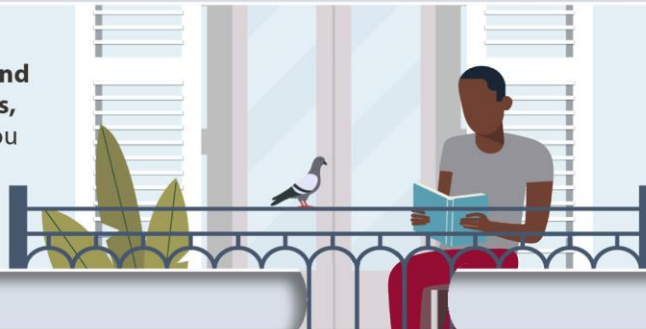

If you have been in close contact with someone who has COVID-19, a public health worker will call you to inform you that you may have been exposed to COVID-19.

You should stay at home and self-quarantine for 14 days, starting from the last day you were possibly exposed to COVID-19.



Self-quarantine means **staying home, monitoring your health, and maintaining social distancing** (at least 6 feet) from others at all times.

The **public health worker can provide information** about COVID-19 testing in your area.

If you need support or assistance with self-quarantine, your health department or community organizations may be able to provide assistance.

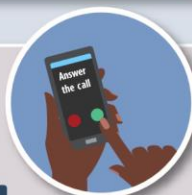
You should take your temperature twice a day, watch for fever and other symptoms of COVID-19, and notify your health department if you develop symptoms.

If you become ill during the 14 days of self-quarantine, you should notify the health department and seek medical care if your symptoms worsen or become severe. Emergency warning signs include **trouble breathing, persistent pain or pressure in the chest, confusion, inability to wake or stay awake, or bluish lips or face.**
