NOTES:

1. HS 222 Historical Method should be taken the freshman year.
2. Six hours must be taken from HS 322, (*Spring Even*), 337 (*Spring Odd*), 477 (*Fall Odd*), 487 (*Fall Even*). The remaining seminar courses are recommended as electives.
3. Twelve hours of HS electives must be taken, eight of which must be in 300+ level courses.
4. Students must complete 6 hours in the same language to fulfill the University’s language requirement. Students who have studied a language in high school and wish to continue this language are encouraged to do so their freshman year if possible. The remaining 6 hours of the language requirement may be fulfilled by a foreign language or cultural enrichment courses.
5. Majors must be careful in selection of electives so that a sufficient number of upper division courses are taken. A minimum of 36 hours of 300+ courses is required for graduation.
6. PS 111 and EB 211 may be counted as the social science requirements in the core curriculum.
7. Students are encouraged to take appropriate Pre-Law related J-term courses (e.g., mock trial, internship in criminal justice system or law firm).
8. Students may substitute another recommended Pre-Law upper-division course for this course.
9. For the general electives, it is recommended that students consider taking courses from the following list: BA 351, CO 370, CO 381, HS 368, HS 377, HS 466, PL 240, PL 260, SO 223, SO 292, SO 333, or SO 444. Be sure to check that you have any necessary prerequisites you opt to take.
