NOTES:

- HS 222 Historical Method should be taken the freshman year.
- Six hours must be taken from HS 322, (*Spring Even*), 337 (*Spring Odd*), 477 (*Fall Odd*), 487 (*Fall Even*). The remaining seminar courses are recommended as electives.
- Twelve hours of HS electives must be taken, eight of which must be in 300+ level courses.
- Students must complete 6 hours in the same language to fulfill the University’s language requirement. Students who have studied a language in high school and wish to continue this language are encouraged to do so their freshman year if possible. The remaining 6 hours of the language requirement may be fulfilled by a foreign language or cultural enrichment courses.
- Majors must be careful in selection of electives so that a sufficient number of upper division courses are taken. A minimum of 36 hours of 300+ courses is required for graduation.
- PS 111 and EB 211 may be counted as the social science requirements in the core curriculum.
- Students are encouraged to take appropriate Pre-Law related J-term courses (e.g., mock trial, internship in criminal justice system or law firm).
- Students may substitute another recommended Pre-Law upper-division course for this course.
- For the general electives, it is recommended that students consider taking courses from the following list: BA 351, CO 370, CO 381, HS 368, HS 377, HS 466, PL 240, PL 260, SO 223, SO 292, SO 333, or SO 345. Be sure to check that you have any necessary prerequisites you opt to take.
