The electives, practicum and internship may be selected so as to emphasize service in one or more of the following leisure service delivery systems: public, private, commercial, community, therapeutic, employee recreation, armed forced recreation, campus recreation, sport management, travel and tourism.
2. Electives may be chosen from: RC 236, 381, 416; PE 211, 221, 226, 272, 361, 371, 443; BA 351; ED 386; SE 232; EX 465; ES 211/L; BI 261/L, 422/L; SO 223 and 333 to total 45 hours.
3. Majors must be careful in selection of electives so that a sufficient number of upper division courses are taken. A minimum of 36 hours of 300+ courses is required for graduation.
4. Students are required to show evidence of first aid-CPR certification as a requirement for graduation.
